WHERE COMPASSION DRIVES ACTION

Part of meeting people where they are means having an open mind because you don't know what's going to happen or what someone is going through.

I am a Community Worker and Intake Coordinator with the Early Childhood Community Team.

On my first home-visit with a new family, I met a couple with a 3-year-old child. Mom met me at the door and was so warm and welcoming, but as I entered, Dad approached me, flustered, and demanded to know my intentions. His past experiences with providers made him distrust me and why I was there. I calmly explained who I was, and said, "I'm here to just let you know the services we provide." I gave him a flyer to our Father's Group, hetook the flyer and exited the room.

Later on, when I'd been working with the family for a while, Dad sat down with Mom and I, and I learned more about their story.

They weren't communicating, and they weren't connecting with their child, but really, Dad was suffering. He had a sick mother that he would never be able to visit and didn't know what to do with his sadness and frustration. He just wanted to see his Mom, and he couldn't, and it was too much for him. But, eventually, he opened up to receiving support, and the next thing I knew, he started going to the Father's Group! Now he's a Dad who's been there since the beginning.

It's not going to happen fast but it's building that trust and that relationship with time that matters and keeping an open mind, so you can be there for someone, however, and whenever they need you.

SOLVING THE STRUGGLES RIGHT IN FRONT OF US

I am, Catarina Juan Fishman, the Program Manager for GIRLS and Institutions, which is our part of the Youth Services Center (YSC) at the San Mateo County Juvenile Hall. GIRLS stands for "Gaining Independent, Resilient Lives, Successfully".

Our GIRLS program provides court-mandated, threephase addiction, trauma, and mental health treatment for incarcerated and paroled girls, who are 13-18 years old.

A few years ago, I was working with a youth who made it very clear that she didn't want to be here. I met with mom separately to find out what was going on, then started meeting both of them weekly. At first, all we did was sit in a room together to see how, and if, they wanted to talk to each other that day. See, parents come with a set of experiences and expectations for their kids. For this mother from Mexico, her expectation was that her daughter would take advantage of every opportunity she'd never had, like going to school.

Mom wished someone had given her those opportunities, and just couldn't understand her daughter's choices. By giving them space, the youth was able to hear her mom's perspective, and explain that she was living her own life. When mom explained her hopes and dreams, the youth responded, "You never said anything", and mom replied, "You never asked". We got to a point where they each understood that they wanted different things. It might not sound like a lot, but it was; they were able to communicate with each other and they, slowly, somewhat started to agree on some things.

The youth has been released since then. While she's not super happy with her parents, she is understanding and respectful. She follows curfew and is not using substances, and she wants to go to college. I worked with them only for a short period of time but in that moment, what they needed was someone to listen and give them that platform to connect. It's about creating the space that made the conversation possible. It really makes a difference, especially to these youth.

BELIEVING IN PEOPLE BETTERING LIVES

In my role as Housing Specialist for our Transitional Youth Services (TYS) and Transition Housing Placement Plus Program (THPP), meeting people where they are means a lot of things.

It could mean meeting up with a homeless youth in the park where they slept the night before, or being there to help a youth do laundry, cook a meal, or apply for job for the first time. Every client we bring into our Transitional Youth Services program is unique, but the main pieces are the same: housing and goal-oriented case management provided by caring adults. Our TYS and THPP program's primary objective is to provide stable housing, but we also look at overall stability, like, what's going on with a client's education or employment.

We have different housing models designed to meet a client's needs. We work on things like conflict resolution, building relationships, and how to keep your house clean.

In our most independent program, youth hold a traditional lease with a landlord, and we provide rental assistance. The youth also learn how to be held accountable and liable for what happens within a housing contract, and we help guide them through how to be a good tenant, and how to advocate for themselves.

With our case management services, it's all about helping clients set and reach their goals. We help them enroll in higher education or help them get and maintain employment.

If they're having interpersonal relationship difficulties, we help them navigate those too. We also do things like role play phone calls and conversations with educators or employers, so youth know what a conversation is going to look like, and what questions they'll get asked.

A lot of our clients are full-time students and employees so there's not always time for them to meet with us, but we do try to meet them where they are, which could just be a phone call, "We just want to make sure you're doing OK. Is there anything that you need? Anything we can do to support you?" So, it's whatever comes up for the client at the time, that's what we help with, like, I always have food in my car because I can ask, "Are you hungry? I have snacks!" So just always being prepared for what might come up.

Some clients face challenges that we sometimes see among youth who have spent time in the foster or juvenile systems. These challenges can stem from disadvantages and circumstances entirely outside of their control, so assessing and bringing clients closer in age, developmentally, with their peers, is part of the work. I was their age not too long ago with supportive parents, lots of resources, lots of privilege, and I was overwhelmed! Often, our clients are just trying to survive, and concepts like money, transportation, and resources are not accessible to them, so we try to make services as accessible and feasible for them as possible. Unfortunately, not everyone qualifies for all services and there's more foster youth aging out than there are programs to support them. Our program is wait-listed but we do offer "After Care", which means that even if we're not providing financial or housing support, we still provide case management services. It's easy to lose track of youth who aren't receiving services but we work to keep them engaged, and to remind them that we're here, so they know, "You're not alone, people care and want to help you achieve self-sufficiency."
